Another milestone for the Mendota Trail...

Benhams Crossing Trestle dedicated along with trail extension to mile marker 6.1



July 16th was another special day for the Mendota Trail! Over 100 people celebrated the ribbon cutting marking the official opening of Benhams Crossing Trestle. This trestle was generously sponsored by Rick and Doreen Heppert, who fondly recall riding their bikes under this trestle many times over the years. This trestle is unique in several respects: it is the most visible of all the 17 trestles along the trail corridor, it has a beautiful curve spanning its length and its stringers are partly comprised of steel.

Several elected officials joined in the celebration and offered recognition of this accomplishment, occurring just eight months after nearby Trestle 3 was opened to the public in Benhams.







The parking area in Benhams was also upgraded to accommodate additional visitors and vehicles. Bob and Ellen Mueller sponsored this part of the project.

The day formally extended the trail to mile marker 6.1. This beautiful section of the trail traverses an area known locally as "the Cut," a 900 foot section with rock walls on each side. Funding for maintenance on this section of the trail was generously provided by Laura and Jerry Grantham, the latter a geologist who was awestruck by the beauty of the exposed rock formations. This area is notably "cool" in another way.... there is a perceptible drop of 10 degrees or so within its confines.

Meet the Tindalls...

Bill and Judy Tindall have been long time trail supporters. Bill, a retired chemist from Eastman, and Judy are committed lovers of the outdoors and avid hikers.

Earlier this summer they enjoyed a hiking trip in Provence, France. From the beginning, they have been engaged in trail work-days. In 2018, they sponsored the restoration of trestle 1, Tindall Trestle. More recently, they committed to sponsoring the restoration of the bridge crossing the North Fork of the Holston River. This is a special project for them, as it is the gateway to the most spectacular section of our trail, Wolf Run Gorge. It is also notable for being the longest bridge on the trail.

The engineering for this bridge is being done by Tysinger, Hampton & Partners, Inc. and Inland Construction, Inc. is our contractor. A special feature of the design will be a spacious overlook area at the mid-point of the bridge where trail users can get out of traffic and enjoy the view. We expect this project will be completed soon so all may enjoy this tranquil section of the trail and watch the river flow by beneath them.

As sponsors, the Tindalls were given naming rights for this bridge. The name **Sunny Side** was ultimately chosen, after obtaining input from members of the Mendota community and others. This is in part a recognition of the music heritage of the area, with the Carter Fold being just 6.5 miles away from the Mendota Trailhead on Mendota Rd./A.P. Carter Hwy. The name also reflects the positivity and resurgence that will increasingly be experienced as the trail brings more visitors to Mendota.

Bill is an active member of the Board of Directors for the Mendota Trail Conservancy, Inc. and has been extremely valuable in helping with design ideas and the procurement of specialized materials for our restoration projects.







Mendota Trail to Benefit from Virginia Outdoors Foundation (VOF) Award

The Mendota Trail is pleased to announce a \$24,000.00 award from VOF for improvements at the trailhead along Island Road. These funds will complement public, civic and private grants and donations already earmarked for the project.

"These funds will be a significant benefit for furthering this project," says Bob Mueller, Manager for the Bristol Trailhead Project. "We are grateful for the support from VOF and for their recognition that our project was deemed worthy among multiple proposals in a competitive field."

Brett Glymph, the Executive Director of VOF shared "We are excited to support the Mendota Trail as both a resource for local families, as well as a showcase for the region's world-class natural resources and destination for visitors."

We sincerely thank Virginia Outdoors Foundation for this significant award.

Update on the Bristol Trailhead on Island Rd.

Preliminary engineering has now been completed. A request for bids was posted in July and a local contractor has been awarded the project.

The work will include excavation and grading for the purposes of building an improved parking area, an ADA compliant access ramp to the starting point of the trail and a detention basin for management of storm water, a DEQ requirement.

Asphalt will be placed on the first segment of the trail, so it will be easier to navigate for those with mobility challenges.

We anticipate work will be completed by late spring of next year. A portion of the project was covered by a grant administered by the VA Department of Conservation and Recreation. However, nonbudgeted expenses were incurred related to the storm water management mitigation and rising construction costs, in general.

The Mendota Trail was recently notified it received a \$350,000 appropriation from the Commonwealth of Virginia for the purpose of restoring additional trestles. This will, in turn, allow the opening of additional miles of trail for public use.

Delegates Terry Kilgore, Will Wampler and Israel O'Quinn were instrumental in advancing the effort, along with the full support of **Senator Todd Pillion**.

This will be a huge benefit for the trail as it will likely cover the restoration costs of four or five more trestles. As a consequence, more trail miles will be made available for the public to enjoy in the area of the "Gorge"....a pristine trail section enshrouded with steep hillsides above Wolf Run Creek. On first exposure, people are truly awestruck. The quiet solitude soothes one soul.

Work will begin on this section later this fall. Two trestles have already benefited from emergency repairs that were done earlier this year thanks to support from multiple generous donors. The trail will work in concert with Washington County in executing the full requirements of the appropriation.

Our board members **Brian Penley, Jim Lapis and Eva Beaule** deserve special recognition for facilitating this appropriation as they worked collaboratively with our elected officials in advancing the legislation.

Thank you to all....this will be a huge benefit for the trail!




One of several trestles scheduled for restoration from the \$350,000 appropriation.






Master Plan Developed for the Mendota Trail

A Master Strategic Plan was completed in June by **Equinox**, an Asheville, NC firm. The 240 page document includes detailed information on restoration of our remaining trestles, design ideas related to parking areas and our trailheads, suggestions related to branding and marketing and safety recommendations for road crossings and signage. The process was steered by **Friends of Southwest Virginia**, using funding from the Appalachian Regional Commission and the Tobacco Commission. In all, the process from the initial grant submission to finalized document delivery, took more than two years.



We thank all who participated with boots on the ground and engaged in multiple Zoom meetings. Special kudos to **Brian Penley, Bob & Ellen Mueller** for their contribution of untold hours for the benefit of the end product. We are extremely grateful to Equinox.... they were a perfect fit for helping us develop strategies and a timeline for advancing our trail dream. In addition, they completed the work in less than the 8 months we requested. Our friends on the Creeper Trail are currently using the same firm to benefit their efforts going forward......we expect they will be pleased with Equinox as well.

Cut to the Chase 5 K and One Mile Run/Walk

A one mile run/walk will be at 8:30 AM followed by the timed 5 K at 9:15 AM. A unique feature of the run is that there won't be any required road crossings.



Our Board is equally appreciative to be working with this hardworking and talented team. It has been a great partnership.










Benhams Parking Area

The Parking Area in Benhams was beautified this spring by Inland Construction after they completed work on the Benhams Crossing Trestle. Our volunteer team subsequently seeded grass in the bordering areas and then placed old railroad cross ties to separate the trail path from vehicle traffic. The entrance to the parking area is on the east end off Rich Valley Rd. and the exit is on the west end opposite Benhams Mall. Traffic is one way to maximize safety and the available space. For the same reason, we ask that people park at an angle, at the bottom of the bank facing Rich Valley Rd. We have also placed a port-a-potty at the eastern end for your convenience.


